LEAGUES



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Following a period of what felt like unstoppable growth, the fine wine market took a hit earlier this year, with Burgundy and Champagne hit the hardest, according to Wine Lister's regional price indices. Despite a rather gloomy 2023, merchants and consumers alike continued their quest for quality and value beyond blue-chip wines and heavyweight regions, leading to the continued diversification of the global fine wine stage. With the aim of exploring new, up-and-coming names, our Wine Lister Leagues and Indicators provide the ultimate wish list of wines and producers achieving great strides in quality, increased popularity, under-the-radar excellence, and more.

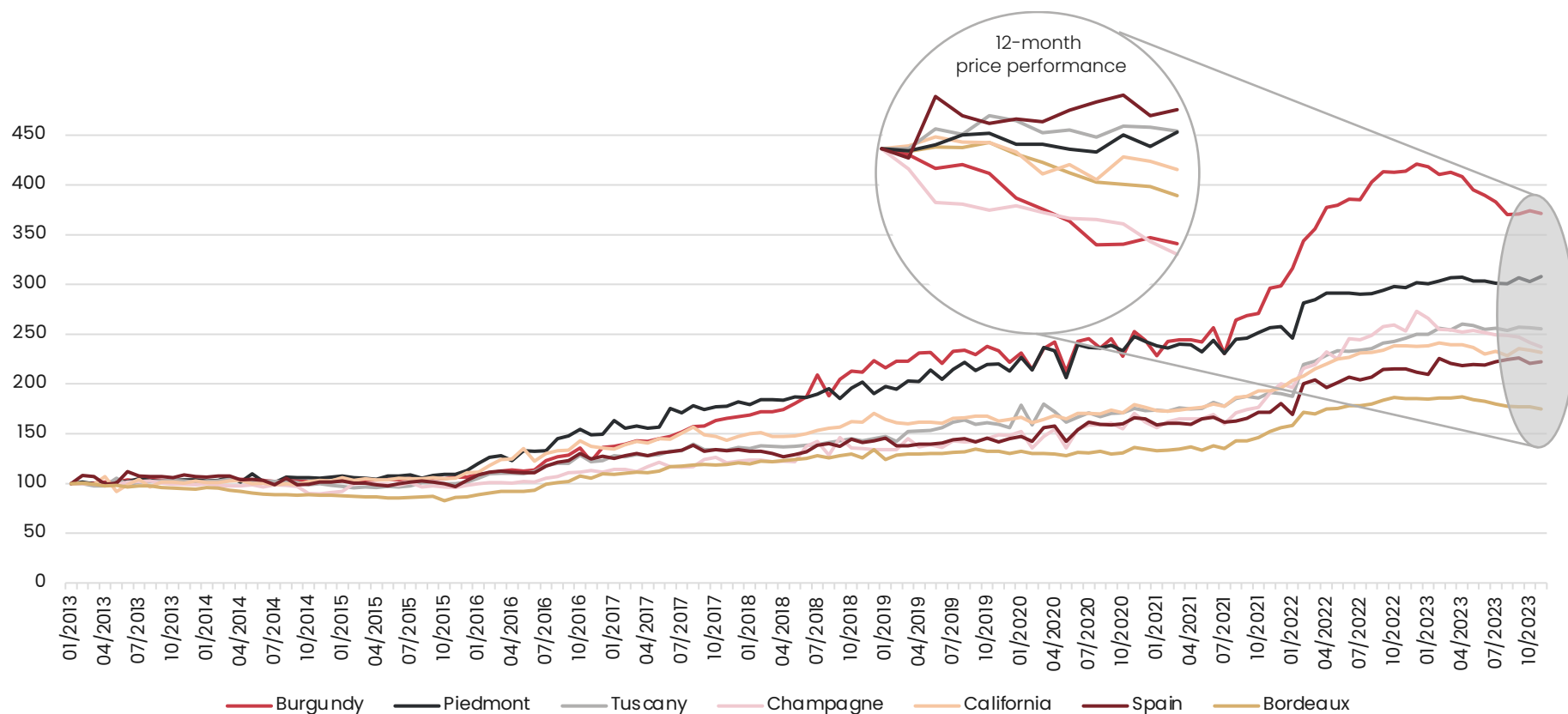
For the fourth year running, Wine Lister has carried out an in-depth survey with key fine wine trade players from across the globe. The 53 CEOs, MDs, and wine department heads that we consulted run companies which, between them, represent well over one-third of global fine wine revenues. This year, our respondents cited over 400 wines and producers, spanning 27 regions.

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PRICE PERFORMANCE

We kick off this year's study by looking at the 10-year regional price performance of key fine wine regions. The price indices shown below comprise the top 20 wines by [Wine Lister Pro Score](#) in each respective region.

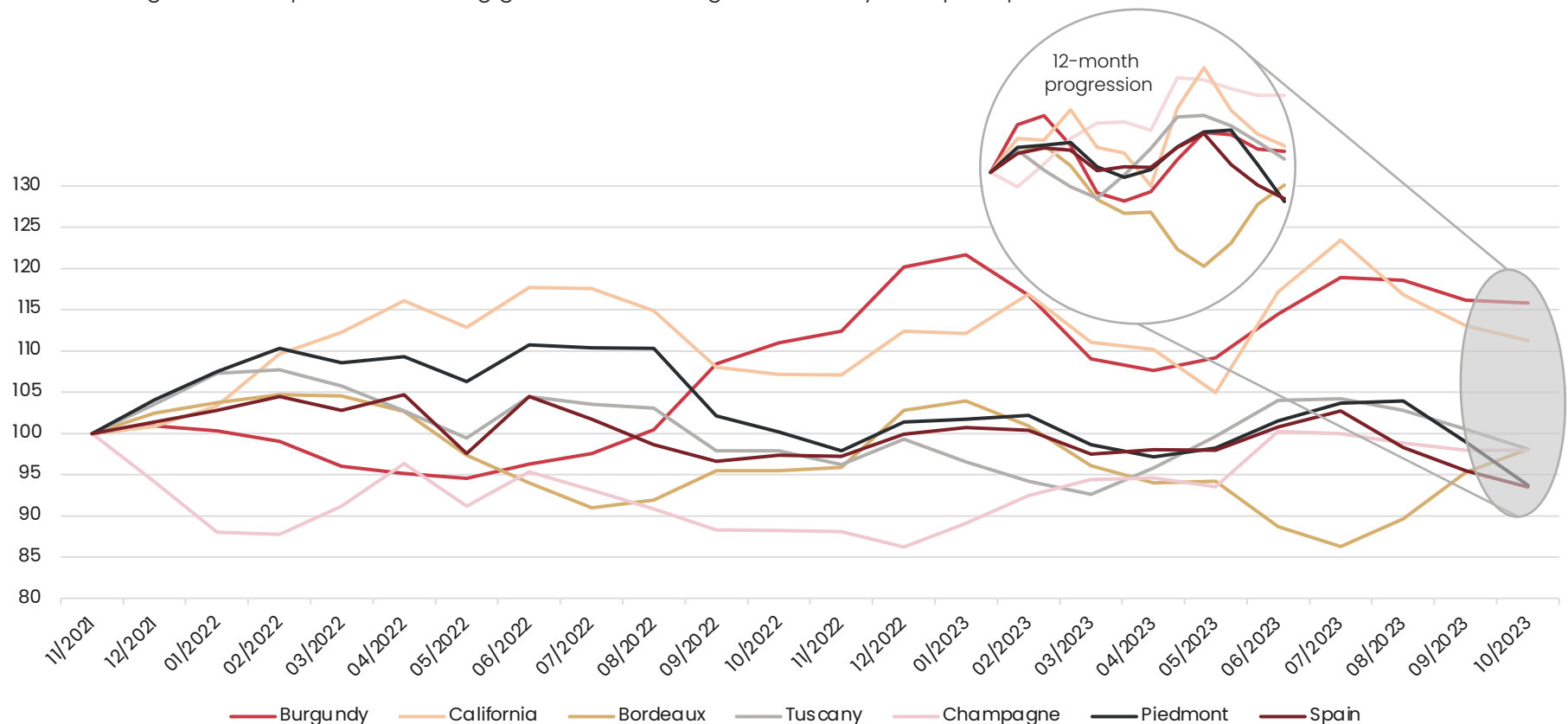
- Following six years of growth, fine wine performance has been rather gloomy for most regions this year, with Champagne suffering the hardest short-term crash (-13%). Burgundy experienced a -12% price correction in 2023, after a 47% increase last year, bringing down the impressive 10-year performance to 371%, followed by Piedmont, +313%, and Tuscany, +245%
- Spain and Italy are the only countries with an increase in short-term price performance, with Spain leading the way (5%), followed by Piedmont and Tuscany (both at 2%)



REGIONAL POPULARITY

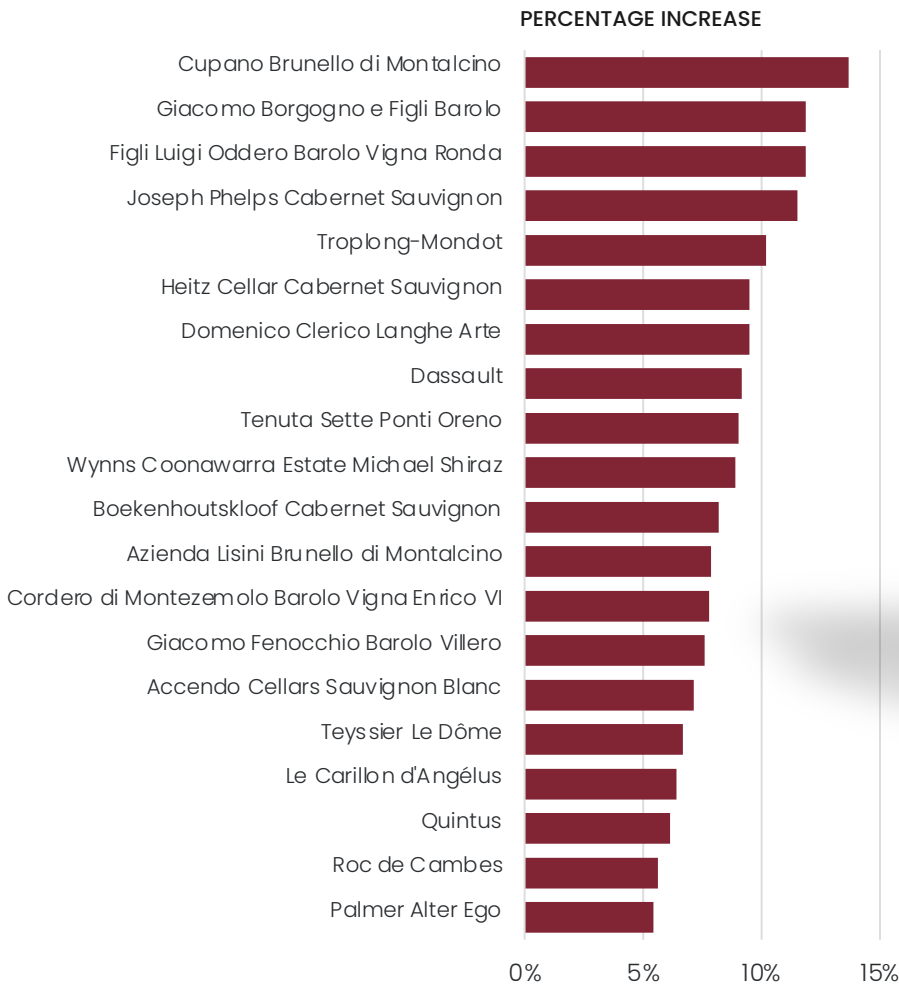
Below we analyse the average search rank progression of the same basket of top 20 wines per region over the last two years:

- Burgundy and California continue to see strong online popularity, while Champagne has almost recovered from its slump last year, having seen an 11% increase in popularity over the past 12 months
- Tuscany experienced a modest 2% rise over the past 12 months, thanks to a peak in summer 2023. Bordeaux continues to see its popularity peak in the run up to the festive season
- We noted in last year's report that Piedmont is falling behind its peers, and the trend continues in 2023 despite positive reviews for the 2019 vintage release. Spain is also losing ground to other regions, contrary to its price performance



QUALITY IMPROVERS

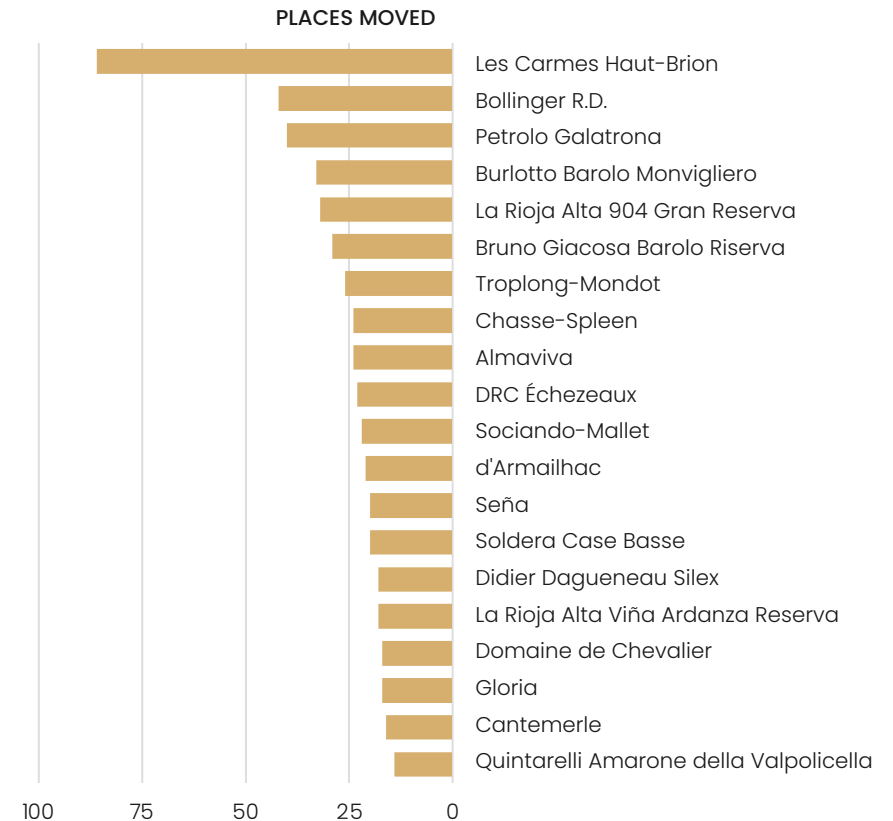
Our first League looks at the top 20 wines whose Quality score, based on our partner critics' ratings and drinking windows, has improved the most over the last two years, identifying which wines are most rapidly improving in organoleptic terms.





BIGGEST MOVERS

With the industry continuing its pivot towards digital solutions, and consumers becoming increasingly broad in their drinking interests, we examine below those top wines whose popularity has increased most in terms of online searches over the past year.



The world's most popular wines are measured using monthly search data from [Wine-Searcher](#), and expressed as a rank out of all wines in Wine Lister's database. Considering those wines in the top 200 in 2023, the chart expresses the number of places each wine has climbed between December 2022 and November 2023.

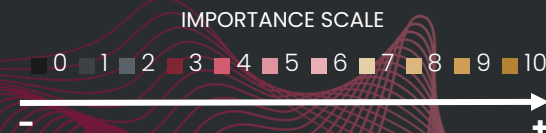
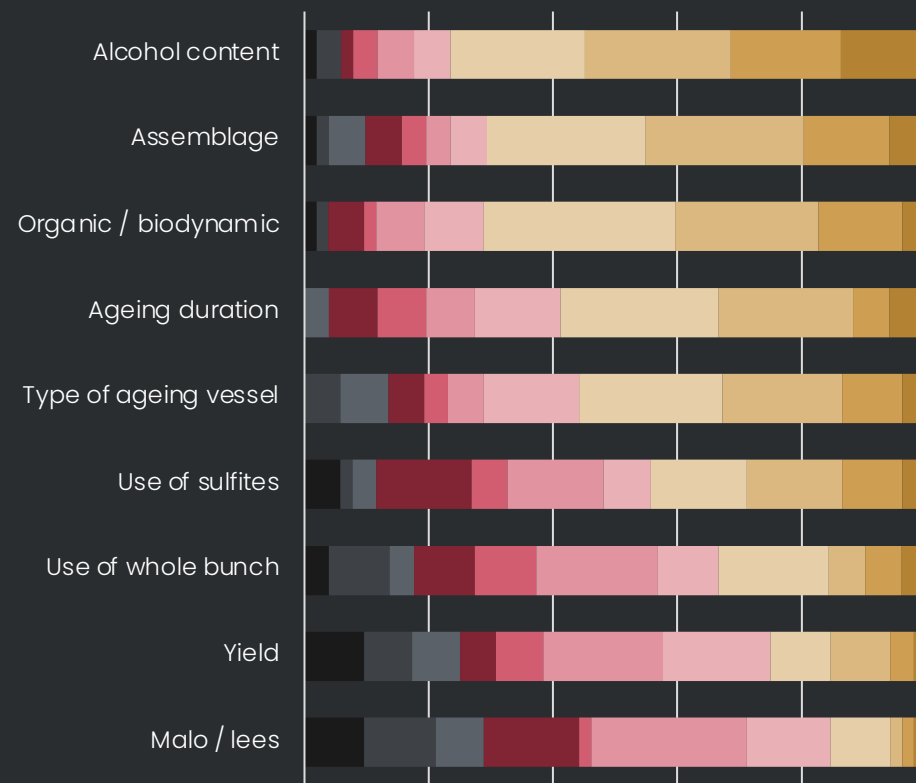
LET'S GET TECHNICAL

WHAT TECHNICAL INFORMATION MATTERS MOST?

We asked 53 leading trade figures what technical information consumers are most interest in, and to rate each factor from 0 to 10, 0 being not important, and 10 being highly important.

Alcohol content is ranked as the most important piece of technical information, with 55% of respondents giving it a score of 8 or more – of which 14% scored it 10/10. One specialist UK merchant mentioned alcohol content as being critical “for those looking to measure quality / balance before tasting, or those looking to drink in moderation”.

Assemblage – grape varieties – was the second most important, followed by organic / biodynamic viticulture in third place, with 45% and 40% of respondents scoring them 8 and above, respectively. The use of whole bunch, yield, and malolactic conversion / lees ageing don't seem to hold as much sway with consumers, with less than 20% of respondents attributing them a high importance (8-10).



WHAT TECHNICAL INFORMATION IS INCREASINGLY IMPORTANT?

We then asked our survey respondents to note any other technical information that is of increasing importance to consumers. Of the range of different themes mentioned, those explored below were referenced most often.

1. ALCOHOL CONTENT

According to our survey, alcohol level is the hottest topic, with 21 mentions.

"Alcohol has become more of a topic with the US leading the way in restrained alcohol, and with a number of warm vintages in Burgundy with unusual high alcohol".

"Alcohol content is becoming a concern, with many traditional wines increasing in alcohol and becoming less balanced".

2. ORGANIC / BIODYNAMIC

Another increasingly important selling point, mentioned 12 times, consumers are swayed by one or both of these practices.

"Organic and biodynamic, as the people who tend to drink fine wine are also among the most environmentally aware".

3. SUSTAINABILITY

Beyond organics and biodynamics, other environmentally conscious initiatives are gaining greater traction, having received eight mentions. Mentions included bottle weight, cover crops, biodiversity, and regenerative farming certifications.

"Sustainable and fair-trade practices have more importance than certified-organic or -biodynamic practices for many people".

4. USE OF WHOLE BUNCH

Whole bunch fermentation was cited four times, including one respondent who noted its importance to Burgundy wines specifically.

"Knowing if whole bunch is used is important, but many customers choose wine that don't necessarily have whole bunch - so the percentage rather than it having whole bunch is important".

WINES TO WATCH

BELARGUS

Investor-turned-vigneron Ivan Massonnat created Domaine Belargus in 2018 from a handful of plots including those previously owned by Loire legend, Jo Pithon. Inspired by Burgundian climats, Massonnat produces a range of single-plot and blended dry cuvées, and variety of botrytised sweet wines. Using only sustainable and biodynamic practices, this domaine is at the forefront of Anjou's renaissance.

BORIS CHAMPY

After a dynamic early career at estates including Dominus and Domaine des Lambrays, Boris Champy has now settled in the Hautes-Côtes de Beaune. This domaine has noteworthy altitudinal advantage in the face of climate change, and has practiced organic and biodynamic viticulture since its founding in the 80s. Sold to Champy in 2019, it is among the first in Burgundy to receive Demeter certification.

DOMAINE DE L'A

Stéphane Derenoncourt, one of the world's most sought-after consultants, purchased his Sainte-Colombe home estate with his wife, Christine, over 25 years ago. Having retired from his namesake consultancy earlier this year, he turns his focus to these 11 south-facing, organically cultivated hectares, divided among various parcels of tuffeau limestone soil.

DOMAINE GUIBERTEAU

After an abandoned law career, a stint at Clos Rougeard, and over 60 years after his family first settled in the village of Saint-Just-sur-Dive, Robert Guiberteau founded this domaine in 1996. Producing his four red and five white cuvées without the addition of yeast, enzymes, or any stabilising products, he has also been committed to organic viticulture since 2003, gaining certification in 2007.

FAVIA

Having both spent time with many of California's leading producers of Bordeaux blends, such as Screaming Eagle and Abreu Vineyards, husband-and-wife duo Annie Favia and Andy Erickson established Favia in 2003. In January of this year, they announced a new collaboration with Huneus Vintners (of Quintessa fame), which sees Favia's relocation from Coombsville to Oakville, and the completion of a new winery set for 2025.



THE REIGN OF THE LOIRE

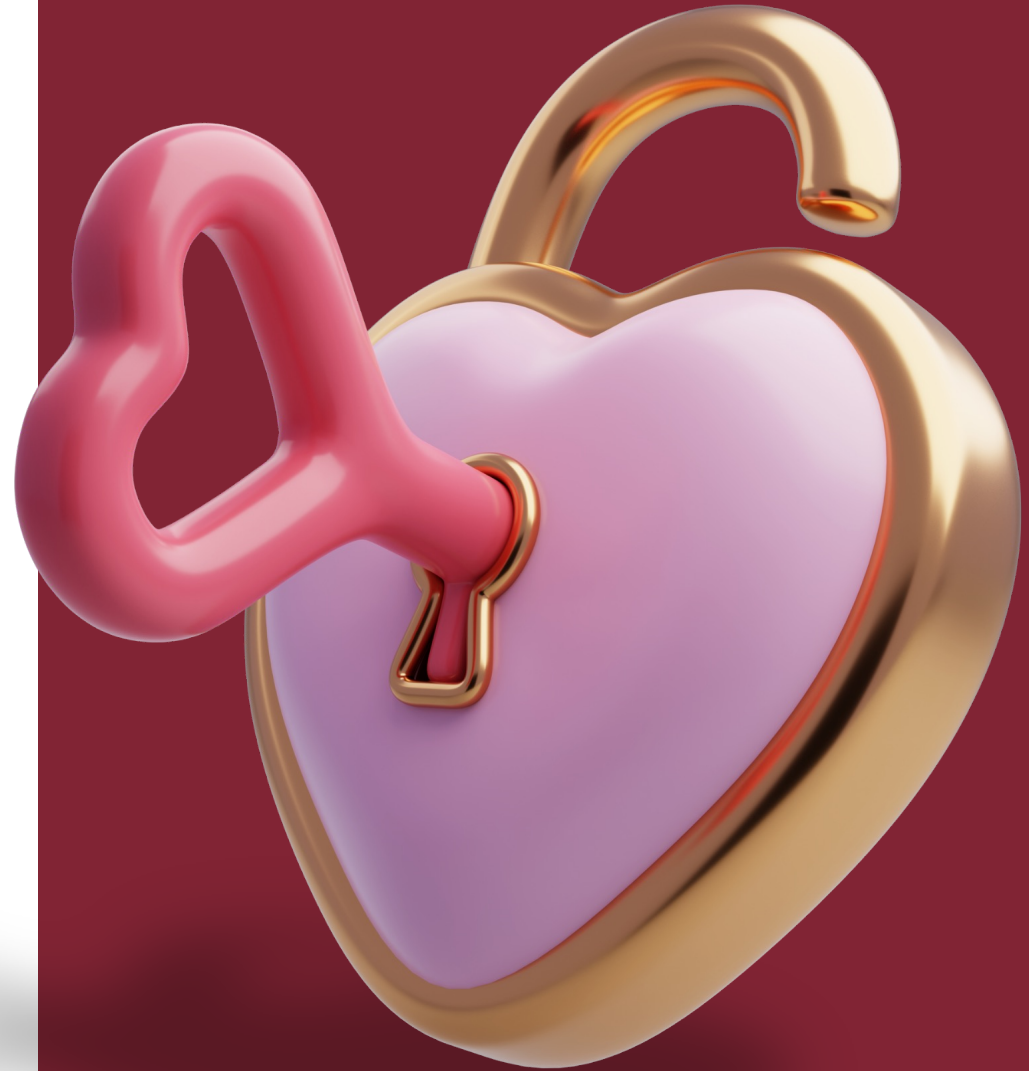

**ELLA LISTER, FOUNDER AND CEO
DOMAINE DU PELICAN SAVAGNIN OUILLÉ 2016**

"A case I bought in 2017 and got delivered at the end of last year, I was gutted to finish the last bottle a few weeks ago. This was in its sweet spot during 2023 and is everything I love about the Jura in general and Savagnin in particular. Synonymous with the region, the historic Savagnin grape is a parent of varieties like Chenin and Sauvignon (and ouillé is simply the topped-up - or normal - version, as opposed to the oxidative approach used for vin jaune). All the elegance of Guillaume d'Angerville's Burgundies can be found in this biodynamic expression of the variety, for a wine that is complex, savoury, mineral and satisfyingly oily."

"One of my favourite producers from a region I hold dear to my heart, G.D. Vajra's "entry-level" (for lack of a better term) red, frequently crops up across the handful of brilliant wine shops near to my home in North London. Offering bright red fruit notes, elegant floral aromas, generous tannins, and tons of energy, it has become my first choice for Friday night takeaways and Sunday lunches. While showcasing the expertise of the Vajra family and their dedicated team, the Langhe Nebbiolo DOC 2021 is excellent value for money and is a must-try for Nebbiolo fans (and anyone simply looking for a thoroughly enjoyable glass of wine)."

"I love this wine, which to me, does not taste like a traditional Brouilly. The carbonic maceration is rather elegant, while barrel ageing brings just the right amount of spice and earthy notes to this ripe, fine-grained, and full-bodied (yes!) Gamay. It's currently drinking beautifully, and given its freshness and vibrancy, I'll be stocking a few more bottles... To enjoy on its own, or with some delicious roasted poultry."

ENVÍNATE LOUSAS VINO DE ALDEA 2021

"An exciting, Mencía-based blend from Ribeira Sacra - youthful and playful, with a plump and juicy wild strawberry core, elevated by subtle herbal notes of fennel and basil. This was my go-to red for long summer dinners, and it still holds its place as the weather turns cold. I particularly love the story of Envínate ("wine yourself" in Spanish) - a collective of four winemaker friends, who met at university while studying oenology and embarked on a mission of producing honest and expressive wines from somewhat-forgotten winemaking regions across Spain, including the Canary Islands and Ribeira Sacra. Their passion is felt in every sip of this wine!"

"I discovered this wine for the first time during a Georgian-themed tasting event and fell in love with it. It's made from the indigenous Khikhvi grape, of which there was just one hectare remaining in the whole of Georgia in 2004. It has since grown to become one of the country's top national varieties and is a great gateway into Georgian wines. With delicate aromas of apricot, peach, and a hint of honey, this cuvée has none of those "funky" notes some people might (sadly?) dislike in some Georgian wines. If you're adventurous but still Kvevri-shy, please give this a try!"

BURN COTTAGE VINEYARD PINOT NOIR 2019

"This is an extremely elegant example of New World Pinot, possibly because this biodynamic estate is typically one of the first to harvest in Central Otago. It's already approachable and drinks beautifully, offering freshness and purity, complemented by a savoury element that makes it a versatile wine pairing option. An opened bottle never lasts long in the fridge, as each sip brings back fond memories of my first visit to the region in 2018."

"I recently discovered this excellent Pinot Noir from the Aude valley in France's Languedoc-Roussillon region. "Nutbourne Vineyards first came to my attention just over a year ago, prompting me to pursue (successfully!) a seasonal role at the estate. This classic method (and classic blend) sparkling wine has a gorgeous white-gold colour. With notes reminiscent of baked orchard fruit and a lovely zesty finish, stocking up for the festive period was a no-brainer; it would go perfectly with a smoked salmon blini on Christmas morning, or even to toast to the New Year!"

"Occhipinti SP68 has recently become my go-to house wine, a true embodiment of Sicilian terroir with its blend of Frappato and Nero d'Avola. Produced by Arianna Occhipinti, a winemaker from the Vittoria region in southeastern Sicily, with viticultural heritage passed down through generations. The product of organic and biodynamic practices, it's a vibrant ruby wine that bursts with red fruit aromas and exhibits smooth tannins, a soft texture, and lively acidity. I highly recommend it for its value."
